

#### The Meal Service

Walk into a boardroom and its purpose is obvious. A movie theatre, a concert venue, an arena, a restaurant, a classroom, a living room, bedroom—the furniture arrangement of so many rooms both ancient and modern tells the story of what happens inside. They're built and arranged for a purpose. Church buildings are no different. The focal point—a representation of Christ usually made from wood or metal—puts Jesus at the center to be praised and worshiped as King over all creation. The pews or chairs face the same direction. In the sanctuary or gym, shoulder to shoulder there's sitting, standing,

facing forward.

During the service we sing and pray in unison. We listen to the same sermon. Maybe there are screens, and maybe there aren't. We

kneel side by side at the communion rail, stand, or walk in line. We eat the wafer, sip from the chalice or the individual cup usually not facing each other. And, despite the way our bodies are positioned in the room, we're often not staring at our focal point either. Maybe an odd occurrence—an incorrect note played or a typo in the bulletin, a child grabbing our attention, someone fumbling a hymnal, a microphone malfunction—causes us to look up and catch another's eye. There's some time before the service to talk—or after. Sharing the peace of the Lord, we might greet each other for a matter of seconds. Maybe we'll get a chance to chat during coffee hour.



Reflections from the Pastor

How much time do we spend interacting with other members of our congregation on any given Sunday? And how much of that is in the worship setting itself? Or do we come together in the same room just *to be alone*? To remain relatively *anonymous*? As we stand shoulder to shoulder facing downward at our hymnals or bulletins or up at a screen, it's easy to forget that Christ is the focal point and that we're all simultaneously experiencing a profound incarnational mystery. Through Christ's presence in the elements we consume, *we* become his very own body—together.

The true body and blood of the ruler of the universe comes into us as his own dwelling uniting us in himself. But does the furniture really fit? Are the seats arranged to acknowledge the presence of Christ in each of us?

Are our sanctuaries arranged to embrace that reality in its fullest?

For a long time, Christians traditionally worshipped facing east toward the rising of the sun—the church nave as the ark bringing God's people to the resurrection. But what if we worshipped facing the resurrected and living Lord in a way that is more than symbolic by facing him as he dwells within our neighbor here and now? During the time of Christ, the meal itself was of sacramental nature. It was a communal celebration of God's continual grace as Sustainer and Provider. Table fellowship—sitting across from people and next to them as a community breaking bread and

thanking God for his gifts—has always meant something. Of course, when Christ places his own body and blood at the center of that shared meal, he sustains us not only in this age but also into the age to come—a feast of love, a feast of victory unto life eternal.

When we eat together, we are no longer isolated and anonymous. On the one hand, our popular culture-driven by shame and the everlingering threat of "cancelation"-pushes anonymity as a safe, nonconfrontational word of salvation to us. On the other hand, in the church. it's good to be known, even if it's not always easy or convenient. It's true that when congregational life is communal, unresolved sin becomes a cause for strife and even schism. It's not just a personal matter. Paul speaks of his opposition to Cephas for breaking table fellowship with Gentiles in Antioch and calls the Corinthians out on their own sin within their community meal. In both cases, there was actual interaction between the members of the congregation. Otherwise, it wouldn't have mattered. After refusing to commend the Corinthians for their table fellowship practices, he encourages them, "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in one Spirit, we were all baptized into one body-Jews or Greeks, slaves or free-and all were made to drink of one Spirit" (1 Corinthians 12:12–13).

Whereas sin has the potential to be a powerful force of destruction within the congregation that actively interacts, the Holy Spirit is stronger, and he brings unity. And the bond of Christ' love the fellowship that we have in him—goes so far beyond the often-anonymous chit chat that often occurs before or after the service. God knows us in our sin, and he knows us in his love, the same love in which we are to know those around us. It's a forgiving and reconciling love to be shared in community interaction. It's a love which brings peace and inspires joy.

While there are different ways that we come together to worship our Lord Jesus Christ, the *meal service* is meant to acknowledge the profound importance of table fellowship and community interaction within the worship setting itself. It's nothing new to the church, and the last several decades have seen a rise in this practice across denominations. Within Lutheran churches, the potentially powerful sacramental implications have often been overlooked. In fact, I believe that Lutheran theology—with our belief in the real presence—lends itself to this. It's another way to gather together and worship our Lord Jesus!

In the meal service, we set the tables with tablecloths colored as appropriate for the liturgical season (green for the Sundays after Pentecost, blue for Advent, purple for Lent, etc.). The service itself is simple. It begins with an invocation, a prayer, and a song. Everyone is then invited to share the peace of our Lord, which means getting your food and eating together for about 20 minutes. People are invited to continue eating through the duration of the service. We continue with an extended reading followed by an interactive message, the Apostles' Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the blessing with another song or two.

Though utilized for the service and present in the room, the main focal point is neither song lyrics nor a piece of wood representing Christ. The focal point is the crucified and living Lord Jesus genuinely dwelling within the heart of the one sitting across from you and to your sides, with whom you're in conversation. Sometimes it's the empty heart—otherwise driven in shame toward anonymity—needing to be filled with the Gospel by the loving words of Christians taking the time to sit and eat and share their lives—a heart that desperately needs real fellowship centered around the word of God. As it's something we all need at various moments in our lives—probably more often than we realize or would like to admit—I continue to reflect upon the question, *do our rooms agree*? How's *our* furniture arranged?

On October 20<sup>th</sup>, we had our first meal service, and it's something that we're going to try to do on the  $3^{rd}$  Sunday of every month during the 9am service. As we're always growing closer together as a community, I encourage you to join in and try it out! It might be something that you like, but it might not be for everyone. Whatever the case, I hope that it's a blessing to our community life together.

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ECCCM Renames to Represent Expanded Service Area. On February 3, 2024, the board of directors of Eastern Catawba Cooperative Christian Ministry, Inc. (ECCCM) unanimously voted to change its name to Ashure Ministry. In August of 2023, the board shared the results of their strategic planning process. They faithfully wrestled with several new realities for the ministry, including their expanding service area. To acknowledge and address the community's growing needs and affirm their goal of serving more clients through highquality crisis and food assistance, one of their strategic goals includes increasing the knowledge and understanding the community has for the mission and work of the ministry.

To accomplish this goal, the board recognized the need for a renaming and rebranding process for the ministry. First and foremost, ECCCM includes "Eastern Catawba" in the name. As their service areas expanded to all of Catawba County, it was important to establish a name that didn't cause potential clients to question their ability to access services. Clients come first. Other reasons for changing their name included some misconceptions revealed in the listening process for their Strategic Plan. A significant number of constituents and stakeholders either didn't know what ECCCM represented or confused them with another local nonprofit.

In August, a strong team of ECCCM supporters brought their creativity and passion for the ministry to the table as the renaming team. They took their role seriously and cautiously, knowing that something like a name change would create feelings of excitement and anxiety. Through a process of elimination, they used three variables to go from 100+ name ideas to the final. Most importantly, these variables include the word's meaning and connection to the Christian faith. Secondly, the availability of URLs and social media accounts was considered. Finally, knowing that people would shorten the name, it was critical that it could stand alone without an acronym.

*Ashure*, known as Noah's pudding, is a grain pudding considered the first meal that Noah from the Old Testament in the Bible fed his family as they left the ark. It is considered a dessert or celebration dish. It is made from leftover grains. It symbolizes peace and harmony among all living creatures in God's creation. In principle, you eat only very little of the ashure you prepare. You share most of it with the poor, your neighbors, friends, and others. This act generates abundance and strengthens community bonds.

The renaming team valued the story of Noah and his family, who lived through struggle and crisis and whom God delivered from the ark. They felt the connection between crisis and struggle was significant. They also valued that the name Ashure represents a celebration, thanksgiving, and sacrifice. It is a shared dish among a community that genuinely cares for each other. It embodies hope for a new day and gives glory to God for bringing that new day. They chose to include the word Ministry in the name instead of the plural version, ministries. The new *mission to provide crisis assistance to the people of Catawba County* is holistic, and most clients qualify for multiple programs they offer. They are one ministry offering comprehensive programs or services.

The new ICON combines three essential elements. At the center is the cross that continues out into the world - a cross that directs and sends the ministry out into the world to serve all people in the name of Jesus. It features the people of God circled in community, reliant on each other for care and support. Each person reaches in and out as they are able at different times in their lives. This represents those who benefit from the services and those who support them. Finally, it features a color palette that reflects growth and new life. The colors are intentionally chosen to create calm and comfort.

Over the coming weeks, Ashure Ministry will begin transitioning all its social media accounts, emails, and website to the new name and branding. This change does not affect the types of programs and services they offer. The people of Catawba County may continue to apply for food and crisis assistance during the transition. "Our donors and supporting churches have stepped up to provide the additional financial resources necessary to continue growing our ability to serve more clients," said Kristal Manning, director. "I am proud of the team's work and look forward to living into this new chapter for the ministry."


