

Who Is the Greatest?

As Jesus is completing his earthly ministry, just before he enters Jerusalem for his final week, which leads him to the cross, he has a strange encounter. He has just foretold his death and resurrection for a third time, and Matthew writes, Then the mother of the sons of Zebedee came up to [Jesus] with her sons, and kneeling before him she asked him for something. And he said to her, "What do you want?" She said to him, "Say that these two sons of mine are to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your kingdom." Jesus answered, "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I am to drink?" They said to him, "We are able." He said to them,

"You will drink my cup, but to sit at my right hand and at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared by my Father." And when the ten heard it, they were indignant at the two brothers (Matthew 20:20-24).

It might seem to us like an odd request. In fact, who could ever be so audacious as to ask such a thing of Jesus? And yet, this desire to be the greatest among the disciples was regularly discussed by them, especially toward the end of the gospel account. In Matthew 18:1, just after the transfiguration, Matthew writes that the disciples came to Jesus and asked him, "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?"

Whether or not we're willing to admit it, this


question "who is the greatest?" probably has a bigger impact on our lives than we might let on. Have you ever strived to finish first in a contest? Achieve success over others? Win an argument? Have you ever tried to outdo someone else in any way? While our words might not betray our deepest desires and intentions, sometimes our actions do. Who is the greatest?

Maybe, if we're honest with ourselves, the sons of Zebedee, at the request of their mother, are not as far removed from us as we would like to think. Of course, the response of the other disciples is

not surprising: they became indignant. Do our attempts to be greater also instigate the same response? To seek greatness in the world and even greatness in the

kingdom of heaven on our terms goes against what that kingdom is about in the first place! In fact, seeking greatness in the kingdom over others becomes a stumbling block to proclaiming and sharing the kingdom and the good news of Jesus.

Just after this episode with the disciples,
Matthew writes, But Jesus called them to him and
said, "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles
lord it over them, and their great ones exercise
authority over them. It shall not be so among
you. But whoever would be great among you
must be your servant, and whoever would be first
among you must be your slave, even as the Son of
Man came not to be served but to serve, and to
give his life as a ransom for many" (Matthew


20:25-28). To be "greatest" in the kingdom of heaven is to seek to become the least.

This saying of Jesus is clearly at odds with the way the world around us operates. It's at odds with the values of our society and culture, which push greatness on human terms, greatness by overcoming others rather than by serving. We're called to something different.

Each Sunday of this Lenten Season, we're going to be reading through the very end of Jesus's earthly ministry in the Gospel of Matthew where we see this question "who is the greatest?" arise in one way or another. Throughout, we'll be comparing our ideas of the greatness of rulers, the greatness of power, the greatness of wealth, the greatness of achievement, and the greatness of status to the kingdom that Jesus has come to bring. How do all those things add up when they are confronted by Jesus himself?

Each Wednesday, we will dive further into the heavenly values of kingdom life as we talk about Jesus as the Way, Truth, and Life. We will talk about the way of love and service, the truth of the Word and of God, and the life of grace and sacrifice. While these things might not lead to greatness in the world around us, they define the path that we take as citizens of the kingdom of heaven. In this way of life, Jesus's kingdom reality is made manifest through us.

I look forward to a blessed and meaningful Lenten Season as we prepare our hearts and contemplate our lives always giving ourselves over to the ways of our Lord's heavenly kingdom.



Midweek Lenten Services: Join us for our midweek Lenten services on Wednesdays (March 5, 12, 19, 26, April 2 and 9) at 12:30pm. On *Ash Wednesday*, March 5th, there will be two services at 12:30pm and 6pm. The theme for our midweek services, "Jesus: Way, Truth, Life" will go along with our Lenten devotionals.

Shrove Sunday Lunch: The Tuesday before Ash Wednesday is sometimes called "Shrove Tuesday", a day in which pancakes are eaten to symbolize one last day of feasting on rich foods before the fasting of Lent. While the word "shrove" means repentance, in preparation for the Lenten Season, this day is also called "Fat Tuesday" or "Mardi Gras". Sunday, March 2, we conclude the Epiphany Season by celebrating the Transfiguration of our Lord. At the end of the traditional service, we will "bury" the Alleluia banners and begin to prepare for the Lenten Season. After the service, we will commemorate this with a pancake lunch! Rather than our trivia, we will also have a special time of repentance, where we lay our sins at the foot of the cross. So, join us for our "Shrove Sunday" pancake lunch!

New Small Group Bible Study - "The Momentum Theorem": There is a new small group Bible study starting! This study, based on Dave Ramsey's book, <u>The Momentum Theorem</u>, focuses on turning things around in your life. Whether it's your relationship with God, family, health, finances, there is always a chance to take things in a new direction by establishing healthy, life altering changes. 
